PROGRAMME EVENTS



TUESDAY 16TH SEPTEMBER 2025

Keith Boseley's illustrated talk on British hardy orchids was well received and generated a lot of interest and many questions from the audience. Keith covered the main reasons for the decline in orchid numbers and species. We heard about their unusual characteristics including their symbiotic relationship with fungi, and use of mycelium networks which give colonies of orchids in local Berkshire SSSI's

He ended by explaining how orchids can be propagated (using a weak dilution of bleach!), and brought examples of seed, petri dish and sowing tube and we observed their growth with a hand lens. These seedlings are grown on and are being reintroduced at Lavel's Wetland Trust (opposite Dinton Park). May/June is the best time to see British orchids. BBOWT have three exceptional orchid local reserves at Homefield Wood, (Marlow common), Hartslock (above Goring) and Warburg (Stonor / Maidensgrove).

TUESDAY 21ST OCTOBER 2025

Andrew Gibb, an avid apiarist and member of the Worshipful Company of Wax Chandlers, will talk on "Why we need pollinators". He will explore what crops require pollination, different types of pollination and how it occurs, the various insects and types of bees involved and how flowers attract insects. He will discuss what pollens are and why they are studied so closely. Finally, the future - the health and abundance of pollinators, what we can do and are doing.

The talk is in St. Peter's church hall, Church Road. Come at 7:15pm for a 7:30 start.

As usual, there will be refreshments and a raffle.

Things to do this month



Wildlife

- Put high energy foods like fat balls and sunflower seeds or hearts out for the birds.
- Put hedgehog and bug houses in place if you have not already done so.
- If you want to provide a natural source of food for birds, choose from one of the many attractive berried plants like Holly or Cotoneaster.

Trees, Shrubs and Flowers

- Autumn is the perfect time to plant trees and shrubs or to move existing ones.
- Lift and divide overcrowded perennials.
- Trim hedges.
- Have a tidy up, cutting down faded stems and messy foliage (but leave some seed heads like sunflowers or teasels for the birds.)

- Pick up diseased leaves from around the base of roses.
- Prune climbing and rambling roses.
- Dig up Dahlias, brush off surplus compost and store through winter in a cool, dry place.
- Herbaceous perennials such as Heuchera and many evergreen grasses will look good over winter and there are many bedding plants that will brighten up the dreary days.
- Choose from the amazing variety of spring bulbs and plant them in clumps or drifts in the borders or choose smaller ones for containers.
- Use grease bands on fruit trees with a smooth bark to prevent winter moth problems. If the bark is not smooth, then an insect barrier glue is better.
- Plant Autumn bedding in borders.
- Protect half-hardy plants with fleece.
- Plant prepared hyacinths in vases indoors for winter scent and colour.

Fruit and Vegetables

- Sow broad beans such as 'Aquadulce Claudia' for an early crop next year. Can be sown direct or in pots for planting out next month.
- Plant fruit bushes and raspberry canes either this month or next. Use Rose Tree and Shrub Compost in the backfill soil to help establishment.
- Dry pumpkins and squash if not already done.
- Cut back yellowing asparagus foliage.
- Move citrus trees indoors to a sunny frost-free position.
- Remove netting from fruit cages to allow birds to eat any pests.
- Clear straw from around the base of strawberries.

General Maintenance and Structures

- Cover or store garden furniture.
- Clean out the greenhouse, if not already done, to prevent pests and diseases over-wintering.
- Clean out ponds and cover them with netting to keep the leaves off.
- Clear gutters and drains.
- Clean out water butts.
- Use the last of the dry weather to paint preservatives onto fences or sheds.
- Raise pots off the ground to prevent waterlogging and to prevent pots cracking.
- Have fleece, plant cosies and cloches at the ready to protect plants and crops in colder weather.
